

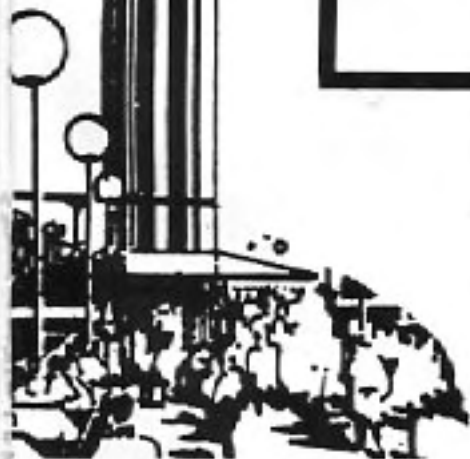

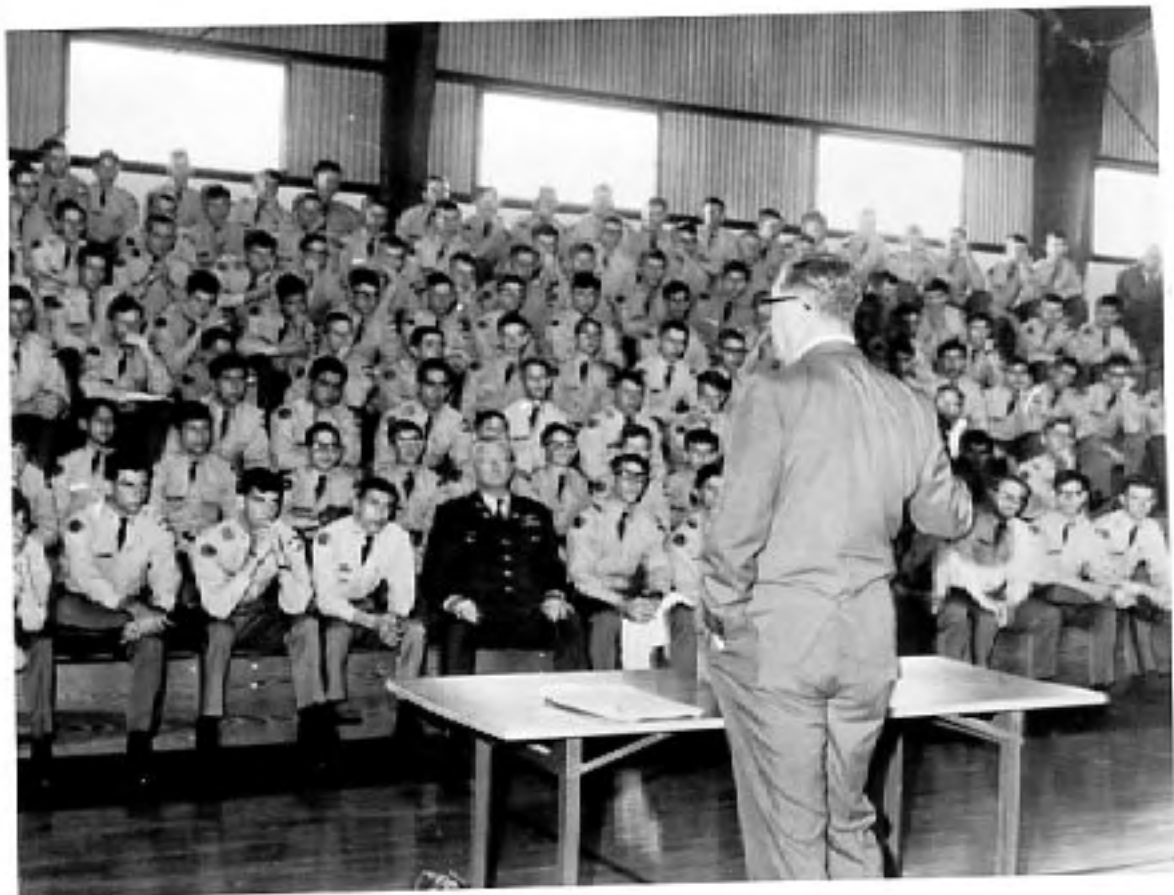


American Legion Oratorical Contest

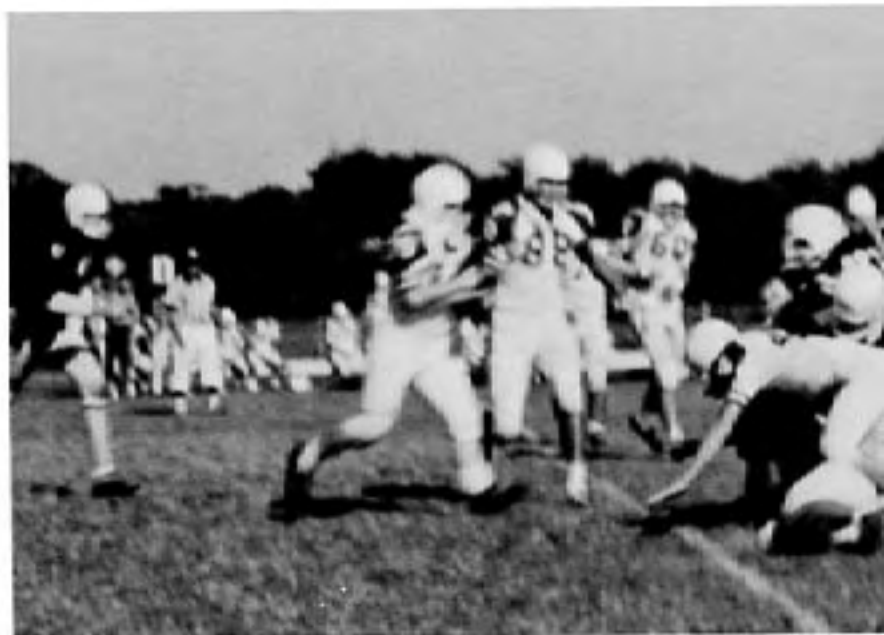

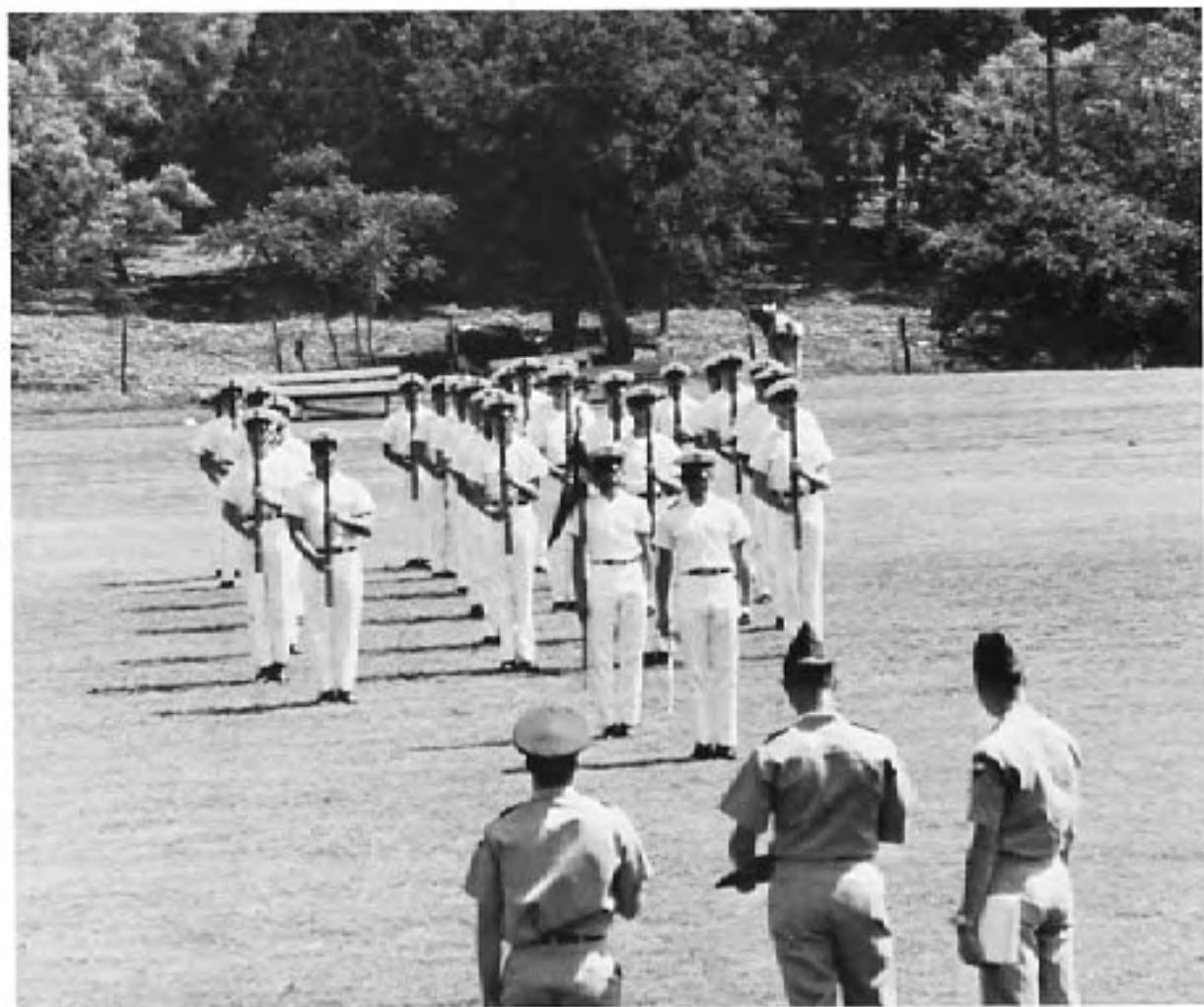
Rifles Guard

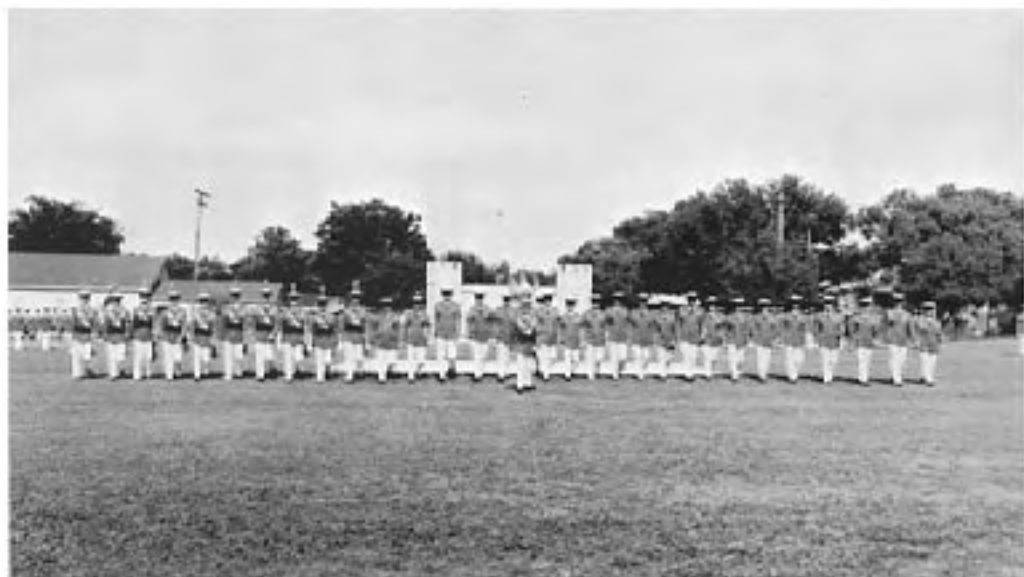

Federal Inspection

Each year we undergo a visit of Inspection by a team of officers assigned from Headquarters, 4th U.S. Army. Then followed inspection of the military records, the armory, barracks, classes in session, and cadets with their rifles. Additionally, we had several high-ranking generals from local military establishments. One of the features this year was a demonstration of sentry dogs from Lackland AFB.

Per our annual custom, we participate as a marching unit in San Antonio's famous *fiesta* parade, celebrating the anniversary of Texas' victory of independence. Our cadets served as the honor guard to the president of the Association which produces this parade, witnessed by over 200,000 people. A detail of cadets was also chosen to receive and place floral offerings in front of the Alamo as other units and decorated floats passed this historic shrine.

San Antonio's Worlds Fair

We enjoyed our school holiday (dedicated to education and culture) spent at San Antonio's World Fair. And many cadets spent many other hours on weekend days during April and May at HemisFair '68.

At left, a 5th century Olmec idol of basalt together with a little Texas girl who appears somewhat displeased. This sculpture is among other pre-Columbian pieces located at the Mexican pavilion.



Another exciting entry from Mexico are the Mariachis of Tepetitlan. These costumed musicians entertain fair-goers with their lively songs while atop a floating lake platform.



One of the most unique exhibits is that entitled "The Magic of a People" by the architect and designer Alexander Girard. It contains over 10,000 pieces of authentic folk toys arranged to show Latin American life in every phase.

Feathered Totonaq Indians, Los Voladores, the flyers, perform a 400-year-old rite on a 114-foot steel pole by whirling around, heads down, tethered by ropes.



Famous artist, Juan O'Gorman, created this mosaic mural which depicts the HemisFair's theme, the Confluence of Civilizations in the Americas. It spreads across a 21 by 110 foot area atop the 2,800-seat



theater. Split screens and pretty girls characterize a new cinema technique, known as Kino-Automat. This is a Czechoslovakian presentation which also proved a hit at the Expo 67 in Canada.
