THE FOLLOWING IS A TRUE ACCOUNT OF ONE OF MY ADVENTURES IN EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

During my junior year at Peacock 1968, I had finally begun receiving a weekly allowance, courtesy of my folks. The whopping \$3.00 allowed bus fare to downtown with enough left over to see a movie or buy a book.

One such weekend, a 95-cent paperback by George H. Estabrooks titled "Hypnosis" caught my eye. That weekend, I read the whole thing from cover to cover, learning the basic methods of inducing hypnotic trance. Being on the rifle team, I saw a possible benefit in relaxation exercises and asked the six other rifle team members if they would care to conduct exercises in breathing and heart rate control. They agreed. The rifle team coach, MSG Wilie Burns, had no idea why team scores were improving in the attic of Johnston Hall. Motivation was attributed to the incentive to visit an antique automobile collection in Dallas, owned by an alumnus of Peacock. Such success encouraged me to attempt greater things.

Attention span was notably short among the student body, especially when given the choice to focus on either homework or the TV at the Richardson Hall Lounge. Such a fertile opportunity to excel could not be passed. I discussed this possibility privately with several students of all classes, stating that they would have the opportunity to maximize productivity of study time with less distraction. The results were shocking. All volunteers improved at least one letter grade average after a six week period of weekly attention span reinforcements. Then came the term paper for English taught by Colonel Burn. My topic was Hypnosis in Education.

Soon after submission of my term paper, I was called to the Superintendent's office. Colonel Wesley was, as usual, the epitome of formal decorum and deportment, although this was only the second time that I had the privilege of private audience with Colonel Wesley. The first was, of course, the entrance interview for admission to the Academy. He began:

"Cadet Shelden, Colonel Burn has provided me with your English term paper on the subject of hypnosis in education, and from the way it is written, it sounds as if the references to students actually refers to your fellow cadets. Furthermore, your paper is written in the first person, as if you actually conducted the hypnosis!"

"That is correct, sir," I replied.

"Do you feel that you are qualified to perform hypnosis, Cadet Shelden?" he asked.

"Only to the extent of attention span increase and focus, sir. Please refer to the GPA's of these cadets, (names given), between the last two six week periods.

"Colonel Snowden! (headmaster at that time) Please bring in the grade records of these cadets," (list of names given to the headmaster). Colonel Wesley reminded me of the grave consequences of such unauthorized practice while Colonel Snowden collected several files. After what seemed an eternity, Colonel Snowden handed the stack of folders to Colonel Wesley. A long period of silence followed as Colonel Wesley reviewed every folder, and then he put the folders down, folded his hands and looked at me with a look that I will never forget.

"Cadet Shelden, I must say that these reports do show impressive improvement. In fact, the least improvement that I found here is one letter grade. However, we, as a school, cannot allow this practice to continue, in light of the fact that parents of your 'subjects,' as you refer in your paper, may not agree to this. I do encourage you to pursue this study following graduation, should you so desire, but I will ask that no more hypnosis be conducted." To which I agreed.
