THE ZOUAVES

The Peacock Zouave Drill Team of 18 members is selected from the best drilled and most military cadets in the Academy. They perform fast cadence, precision drill movements on a specially-constructed wooden platform 30 square feet in area. Their performance is climaxed by a thrilling wall-scaling demonstration. The entire team with their rifles, sword, and guidon scale a 10 foot imitation castle wall in approximately 30 seconds. This year the team set a new record—21 seconds.

While the normal cadence of a military marching unit is usually 120 steps per minute, the Zouaves march at the rate of 280 steps per minute.

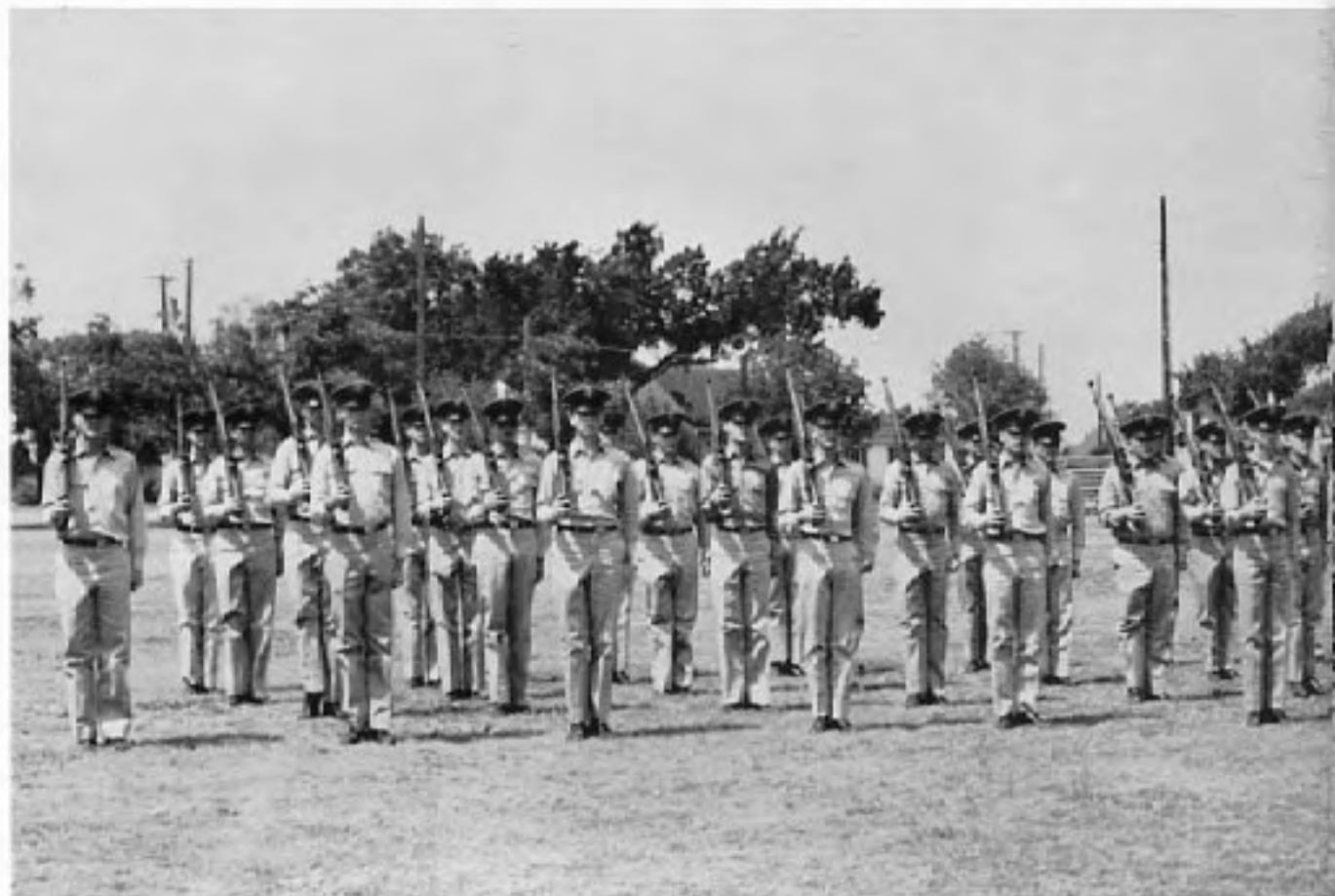
Historically, the Zouaves were originally Algerians of North Africa. They wore brilliant, distinctive uniforms and being Moslems, they also wore fezzes.

The team was commanded by Cadet Captain George Alpert and Cadet 1st Lieutenant Jerry Crain and under the supervision of Lt. Col. Feltner.

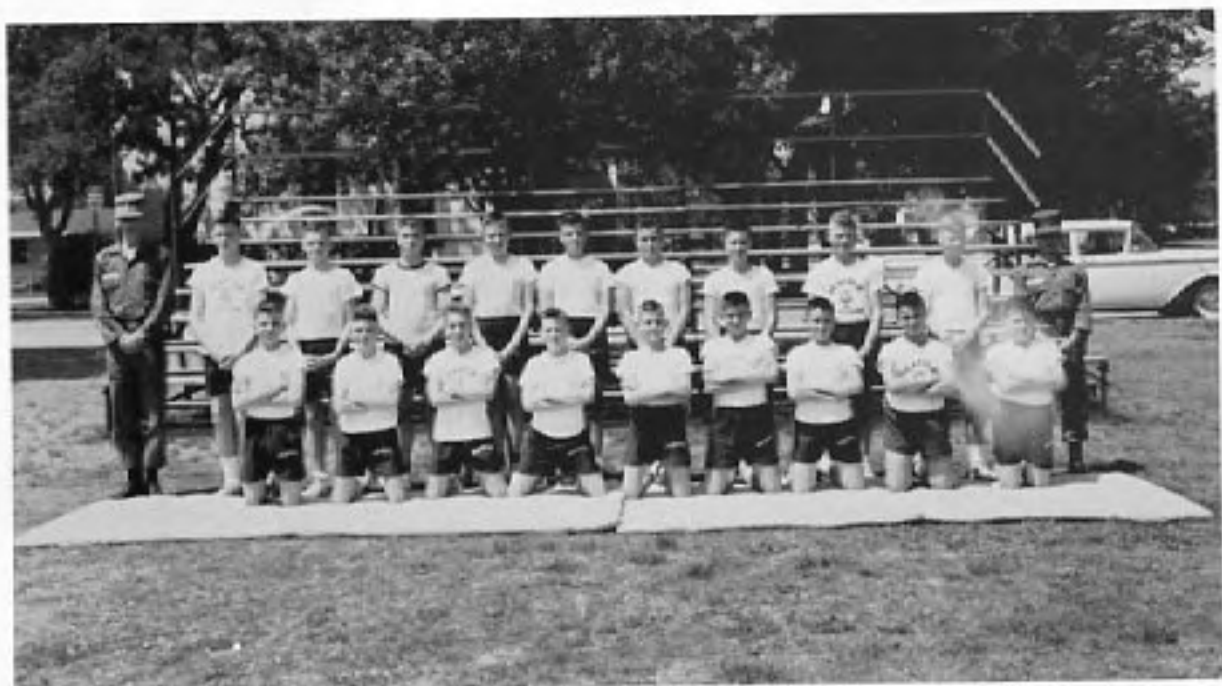

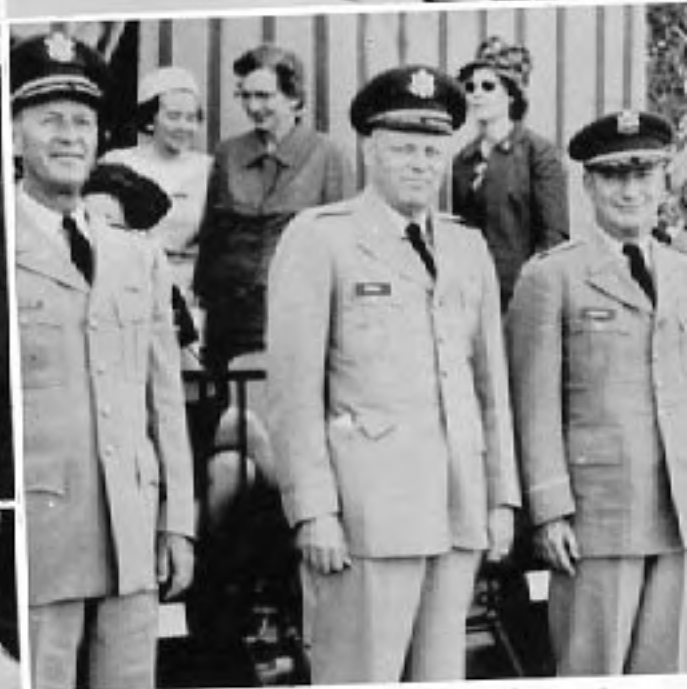
