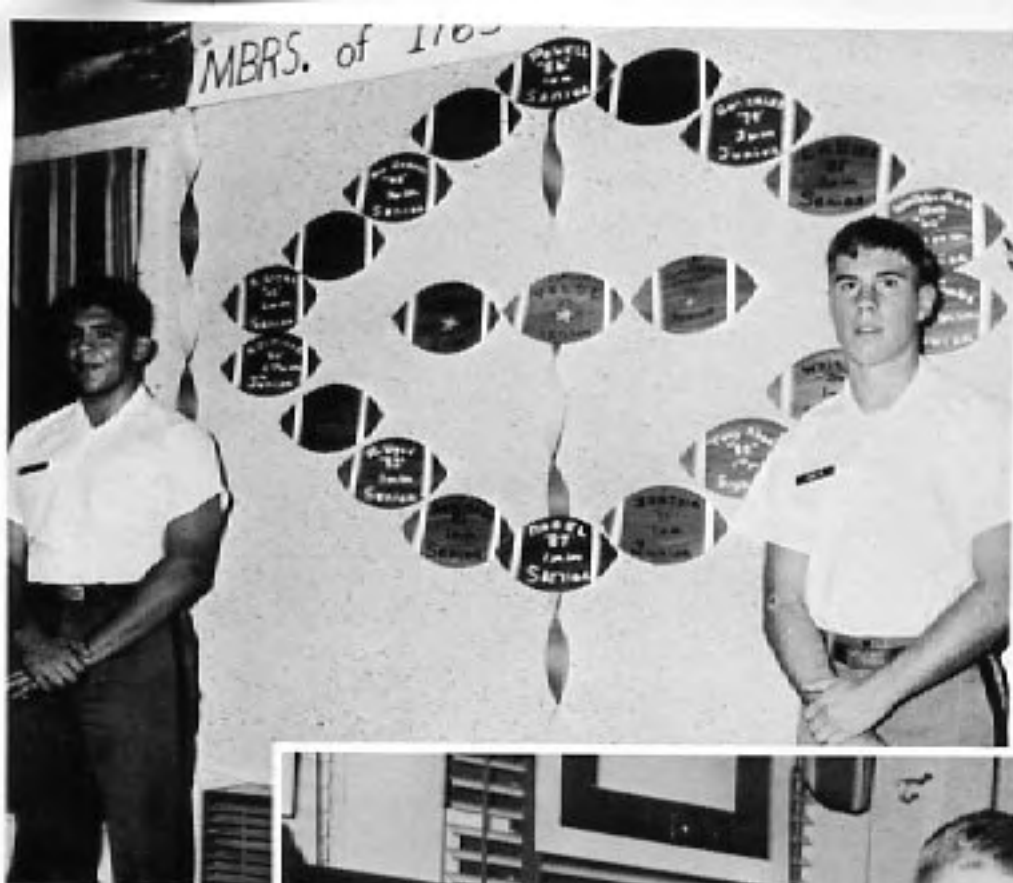

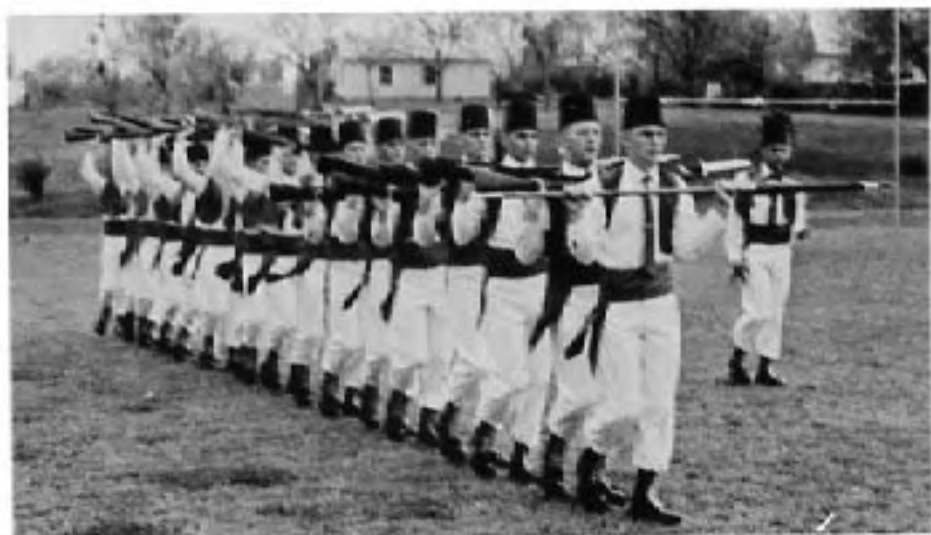

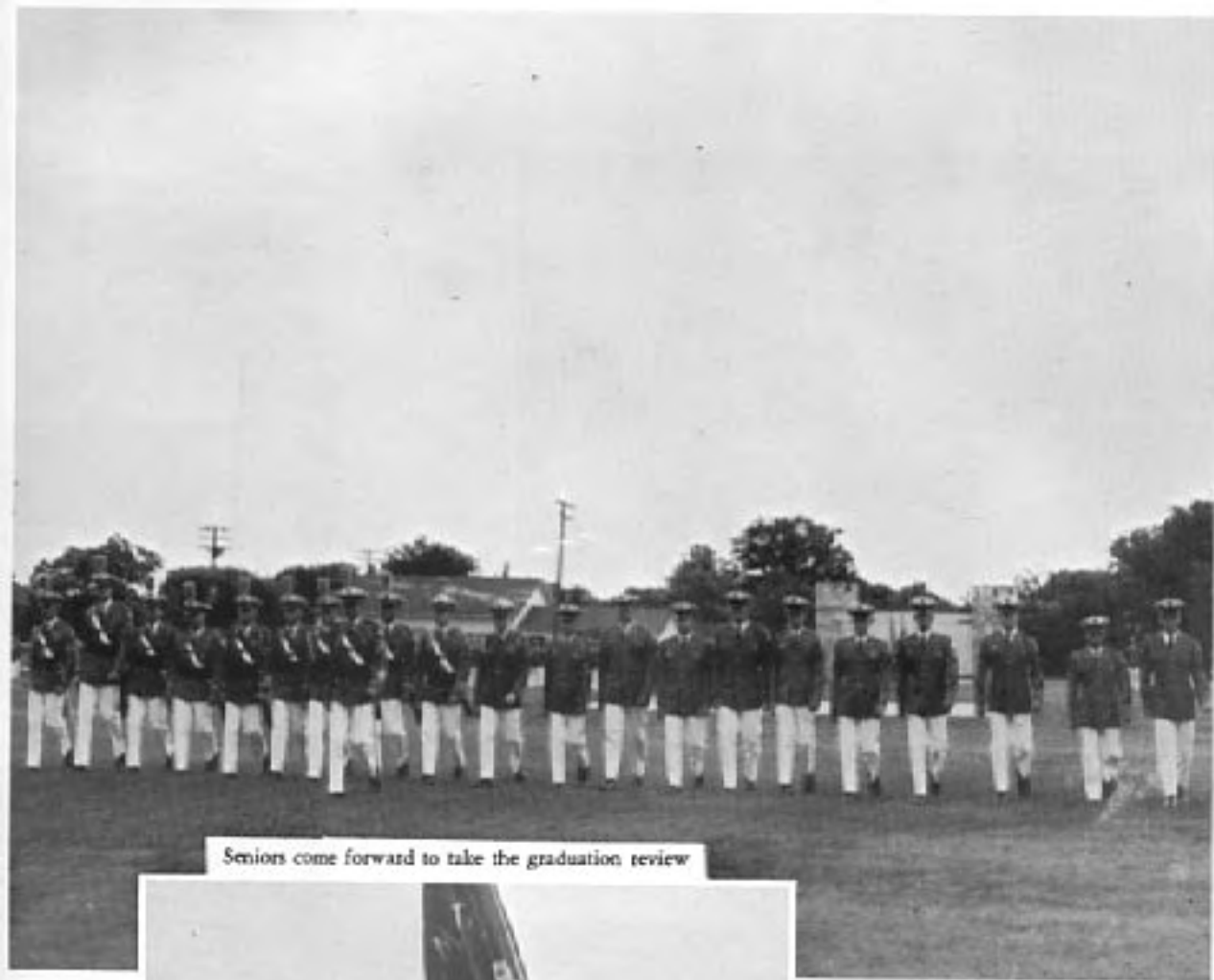

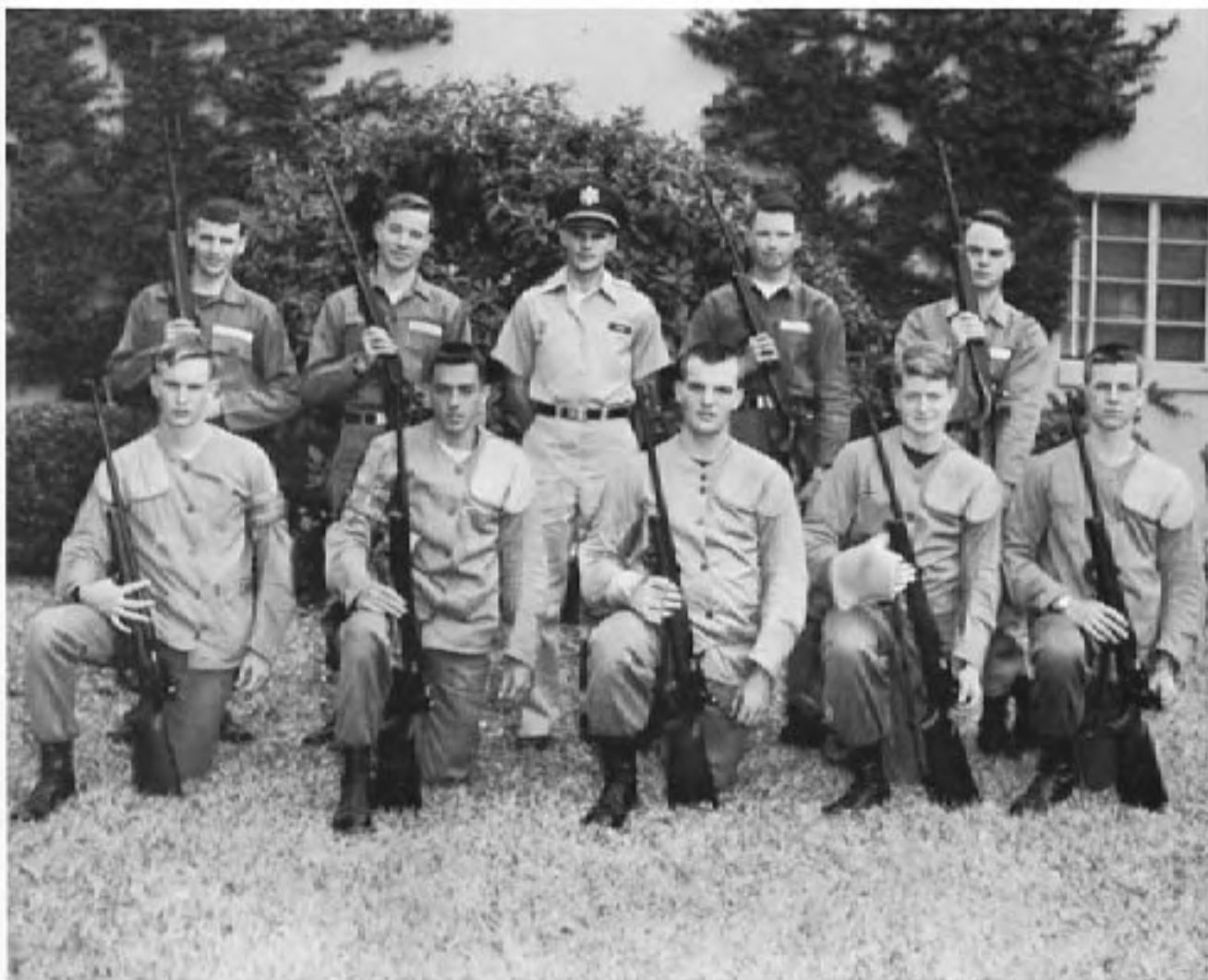

# Zouaves

The Zouave drill team is the most unique drill unit in Texas. Their distinctive uniforms are modeled after an Algerian unit in North Africa. They perform a series of precise movements keeping a very fast cadence of 280 steps per minute. The normal marching cadence is 120 steps per minute, consequently one realizes that the Zouave "stomp" as it is known, really calls for co-ordination and skill. Their demonstration comes to a climax as the Zouaves, with their rifles, scale a ten foot wall in less than thirty seconds.

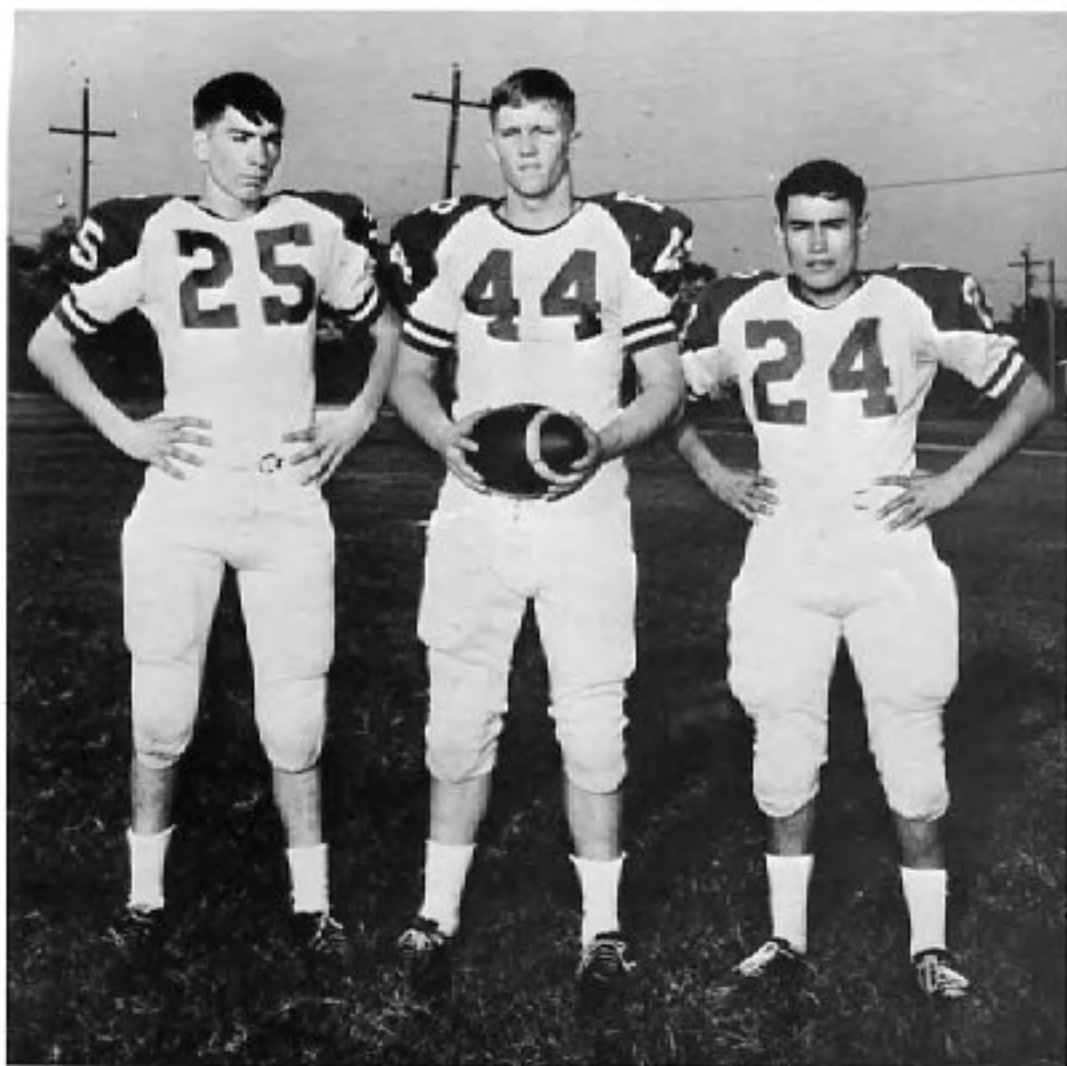
