HELP PERPETUATE THE PEACOCK LEGACY THROUGH OUR SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The monument on the Senior Terrace has a statement that begins with these words: Between the years of 1894 and 1973, the lives of 15,000 students were shaped by a tradition of discipline, honor and personal pride. Sadly, no longer does Peacock Military Academy continue with this worthy endeavor.

The Peacock Military Academy Alumni Association (all of us), was incorporated in November of 1983 and subsequently, in August of 1985, it was established as a Non-profit Organization under the provisions of Section 501 (c) 3 of the Internal Revenue Code.

The general definition of a NPO is an organization that has been formed by a group of people to pursue a common non for profit goal without the intention of distributing its excess revenues to members or leaders. A non-profit organization is dedicated to furthering a particular social cause or advocating for a particular point of view.

The stated purpose of the Peacock Military Academy Alumni Association in its Articles of Incorporation is to advance the cause of education as described in section 501 (c) 3 of the Federal Code. It is also stated in those Articles that upon the dissolution of the Association, after paying for all liabilities, all assets shall be disposed exclusively to organizations involved in educational, charitable or religious endeavors.

The Peacock Memorial Scholarship Fund was established in April of 2013 to comply with our educational purpose, and to parallel our shared objective of perpetuating the Peacock Legacy of continuing to shape, in a positive manner,

the lives of future generations of young individuals.

The plan for the Peacock Scholarship Fund is to never touch its "corpus" or principal. We will always distribute only the earned interest from investing the fund. Our fund corpus must first reach a minimum amount required (\$250,000) that will allow us to participate in low fee fund investment opportunities.

Our Memorial Scholarship Fund has grown with the generous matching contributions from a donor who has chosen to remain anonymous. Our kind benefactor pledged to match dollar per dollar all contributions for 5 years. April of 2018 marks the end of this pledge. We have only 9 months left to make each contributing dollar count twofold.

So, where are we? We are close to \$210,000 which is \$40,000 short of \$250,000. Since contributions are matched dollar per dollar, we need at least \$20,000 to reach this mark. If 300 of our 600 members contribute with \$75, we can surpass this mark easily.

We know that not everyone can contribute at that level, but we have several big-hearted Peacock Kadets that can surpass that amount. But know this: even \$1.00 contributed earns not only our appreciation but also the gratitude of a future deserving young individual. It is in our hands to continue the valuable work and legacy of the Peacock family. We are proud extended members of this family.

LET US DO OR DEE. We could also say: Let us do before we dee. We can in this manner assure that the clear notes of silver taps will sustain its lingering echo across the campus of PMA. Thank you Brothers.

The Origin Of the Peacock Motto LET US DO OR DEE

A few weeks ago I was asked by a fellow Peacock Kadet to clarify for him what the meaning of the word Dee was. I remembered my father (Arthur Wolf PMA '51) telling me that to dee meant

to die in old English. But instead of giving that straight simple answer, I responded to my fellow Peacock brother that I would research the word and the origin of our great motto Let Us Do Or Dee.

I found out that the word Dee indeed meant to die. I also found out that in Old English it later meant "doing". People would ask: What are ye deeing? (What are you doing?). I found out that it can also mean accomplishment. I also found that there is a River Dee in Scotland.

So my tentative response of the meaning of the Peacock motto was: Let us do or accomplish something, and if the mission is extremely important for survival or worthy cause, be willing to give your life for it.

Not yet satisfied, I contacted Donna Peacock for more guidance and her response was enlightening. She said: "My understanding of the motto Let Us Do Or Dee, with Dee at one time meaning literal death— is to be willing to sacrifice yourself for a just cause—but most probably, "Never to Give Up", to keep trying, striving for the best". She then gave me the best clue ever! Donna told



me to check out the Scots song "Scots Wha Hae" with lyrics from a poem by Robert Burns in 1793.

The song lyrics are meant to be a speech given by Robert the Bruce before the Battle of Bannockburn in 1314 where Scotland maintained its sovereignty from King Edward of England. For movie fans, this battle was depicted in Braveheart by Mel Gibson.

Travis L. Snow '15 Hero of the Meuse-Argonne

The Peacock Alumni Association was contacted through our Website http://www.pmaalumni.org/ by Mr. Mardi Timms from Wisconsin. He decided to research Peacock Military Academy because his great uncle attended Peacock according to his Army records. His name was Travis L. Snow. What we later learned is very touching. Please read.

Travis Snow was born in Rockdale, Texas on July 22, 1896. He died on September 30, 1918 in France. Travis Snow enrolled in Peacock in 1909. Sadly, his mother died in 1910. He went to live with his uncle and aunt in Torrington, Wyoming who later adopted him. This is why our Peacock records show his home town as Torrington.

As a Peacock Cadet, Travis L. Snow was a classmate of Col. Wesley Peacock Jr. At age 21 he joined the Army to serve in WWI. He was a member of the 91st Division, 363rd Infantry which was involved in the Meuse-Argonne offensive that took place from September 26 thru November 11, 1918. Travis Snow died on the 5th day of the offensive that ended the war. Armistice was signed on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

Americans lost 26,277 men in the Meuse-Argonne. Over 100,000 were wounded. Travis Snow made the ultimate sacrifice for his country in the fields of France so that others could enjoy liberty and freedom. His grave at the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery and Memorial is silent testimony of his bravery.


spreading the word of God and helping people in need.





PEACOCK IRON HORSE CAVALRY RIDES INTO TOMBSTONE

What began last May, was a ride from San Antonio to Tombstone, Arizona. The men, not exactly cowboys on horseback but retired happy go lucky riders on Iron Horses, in other words, motorcycles.

I was the first to arrive at our departure place and naturally, it started with the obvious: Problems. I forgot my cell phone which I was going to need to contact two fellow riders in El Paso. My two companions from San Antonio, Raul Gonzalez and fellow rider Oscar Martinez were late. Raul is always on time; but today, of all days, he was not. My quandary was, do I wait and prolong our departure time or rush

Both McLaury brothers were killed along with one of the Clantons. The score was bad for the losing side, three to nothing.

We stayed two nights and watched reenactments of the shooting at the OK Corral, visited the Bird Cage Theater, ate like hungry men after distant travel, drank a few beers and did all that tourist stuff. And in all, it was a great trip!

If you have never visited Tombstone, watch the movie and visit. It is a fun and very interesting place to go, whether by car or motorcycle!
