What is this war we are fighting? Why do men die under a foreign land under a foreign flag?

Peace is nothing more than our liberty in repose. Peace will certainly result from this latest venture into war because history has shown that peace is the result of war.

But these are not the only reasons that America is engaged in war. Over the centuries man has become a military advocate; he is fascinated by a parade, and he loves the sound and smell of battle. It has always been considered an honor to die upon the field of battle. A soldier's death in battle is a hero's death. A person's manhood is still tested in battle today just as in centuries past.

Certainly war is a dirty game, but it is a necessary evil of mankind. It is a necessary offspring of politics, which in itself holds no boundaries. It is known that persons other than soldiers involved are killed in battle; however, in a war such as we are now fighting, there are no defined boundaries; the enemy is everywhere.

For all the arguments against the war one cannot say that we wage war as a national pastime. Neither do we wage war to the bitter end. We believe in peace. We have given ample chance for the other side to match our concessions. We have given as much leeway as we can safely give without jeopardizing the lives of more Americans.

It is the duty of free countries, such as America, to protect the liberty of smaller countries that are incapable of defending their own way of life. The United States and every other free country in the world must not come under the heavy hand of the totalitarian governments of Russia or China or any other country. For ourselves and for all other free countries we must agree, "Millions for defense but not a cent for tribute."





CHOPPER MYSTERY SOLVED

Have you ever wondered who that is buzzing over the Academy on Tuesdays or Thursday afternoons in a helicopter? Well, it is none other than our own S.A.I. Maj. J. A. Guerin.

Maj. Guerin is flying with the 507th Air Ambulance Company at Fort Sam Houston. This unit is better known as operation M. A.S.T. or Military Assistance to Safety and Traffic and is a six-month project originated by the United States Department of Defense. This unit is proving itself vital to the area for evacuation and assistance to civilian medical emergencies. Maj. Guerin is attached for flying and administrative duty.


The type of helicopter used is the UH-IH (Huey) which can fly for two and a half hours at a speed of 120 miles an hour. The cost of the helicopter is about \$250,000.

Maj. Guerin has been flying with the Army since 1965 and is rated an instructor in all of the Army helicopters except the Ch-47 Chinook.

He feels very strongly that flying is a very rewarding and exciting profession.


On the football field the story was much the same. This time the new members were asked to report for the "Skirmish Line" which was a necessity for any football team.
