EIGHTH ALUMNI REUNION

Honored guests at both social affairs included Donna Peacock, who has been elected an Honorary Member of the Alumni Association in recognition of her book "Parade Rest", a invaluable addition to the history and archives of the Academy; and Sue Ellen Peacock Hains. Also honored was Mrs. Reginald (Elaine) Austin, 1st Vice President of the Salvation Army Women's Auxiliary (Custodians of the Peacock House), who did all the planning for the renovation and interior decoration of the Wesley Peacock House.

OPEN HOUSE SUNDAY

Approximately 150 alumni, spouses, and friends attended the Open House at the Wesley Peacock House on Sunday morning, August 4th. This has been the closing highlight of each Reunion and this one was outstanding for two reasons: It was sponsored by the Salvation Army Women's Auxiliary, Custodians of the House, and was the first Alumn Open House since the \$60,000.00 renovation of the house made possible by "PAR", Alumni Association the Women's Auxiliary, and the Salvation Army.

1931 FOOTBALL TROPHY RETURNED

When Peacock closed in 1973, Col. Wesley gave Olegario Losoya of Del Rio the 1931 Championship Football Trophy and the original football used in winning the game against TMI. Losoya was the captain of the 1931 team and graduated that year as First Captain & Battalion Commander. When he learned that we were seeking memorabilia for the Peacock House he generously returned the trophy and football to the Alumni Association and these items are now on permanent display. His two sons also graduates of Peacock — Cadet Lt. Oligario Losoya, Jr., Class of 1960; and Cadet Capt. Jose Losoya, Class of 1963.

ANTIQUE PISTOL DISPLAYED

One of the display cabinets in the Peacock House now contains an antique pistol made in 1855 at the Harper's Ferry Arsenal. It was property of Col. Wesley Peacock, Jr. and he left it to the Alumni Association.

VIDEO CASSETTE FILM OF PEACOCK

Thanks to the widow of <u>Bobby Bell Edwards '47</u> we now have movies of parades and other school activities during the years 1946-1947, inclusive. Thanks to <u>Paul Weston '51</u> we have movies of the graduation parade and final exercises of 1952. Thanks to <u>Steve Copenhaver '66</u>, our film library now contains movies of the various drill teams and other activities during the four years 1963-1966 inclusive. The 8mm and 16mm films were loaned to us and we had them transferred to video cassette.

NEW DISPLAY CASE PURCHASED

When he concluded, Leal and I both expressed tight-lipped appreciation for his advice, saluted smartly and then proceeded to stumble over each other in our scramble for the doorway. As I crossed the threshold, Col. Wesley bellowed this parting admonishment, 'Cadet Powell, keep your zipper up!'

I cherish this and the many other fond memories I have of my years at Peacock. Col. Wesley will be missed, but his legacy will never be forgotten by those of us whose lives he greatly influenced."

EXTRACTS FROM SCHOOL PAPER 'PEACOCK REVIEW', APRIL 1948.

"The McKinnon Rifles crack drill team made a grand entrance Sunday, April 11, 1948 at their first public exhibition of the year. Lt. Charles Ritchie of Eagle Pass is the commander, Sgt. Roy Starnes of Austin is guidon carrier, and Sgt. Robert Ray of Dallas is guide. Leaders of the four squads are Sgts. Buzzini, Sims E., Gill, and Gibson. Major Dick Thiesen is the team Sponsor.

"The wide-open space bounded by Birkhead Hall, the Auditorium, and Wilson Hall has been officially designated as the <u>"Senior Terrace"</u>. It is becoming almost "sure death" for an underclassman to be caught on what has become "sacred soil" for seniors only"

Thanks to <u>Sheldon Anisman '51</u> for sending us the copy of "Peacock Review" of April 1948, from which the above was extracted. Sheldon also donated his dress uniform. He graduated from the University of Texas and is an attorney, living in Fort Worth.
