"Both audiences and cadets loved the excitement and the color of the Sunday afternoon parades: First, the formal Retreat Ceremony complete with the field band's Trooping of the Line, the Officers and Colors Front and Center, and the Pass in Review.

Then spectators clapped and car horns honked in appreciation as the distinctively uniformed Zouaves unit performed its fast cadence precision drill. The crack drill team was only in its second year of existence and its novelty had solved a minor problem for the school's Commandant and Headmaster the past summer.

Don and Ellen Peacock Lawson and Vera Richardson were vacationing in Monterrey, Mexico, when the uncle of cadet Frank Rodriguez ('42) invited them to attend a large costume ball at a prestigious private club. To solve the costume problem they telephoned Wesley Peacock Jr. in San Antonio to ship two complete Zouave outfits via the next bus. That evening two gentlemen in white shirts, white pants with leggins, green vest, tie, and sash, and topped with green fezhats impersonated Zouaves in a far less strenuous way than the fit young men at the spring dress parades who delighted audiences with their 280-300 steps per minute and wall scaling fast-paced their feats."

## RIVER PARADE MEMORIES By Dick Thiesen

Many of us remember the River Parade on Monday night during Fiesta Week. I wonder how many remember that for the first few years barges used for the parade were operated by Peacock Cadets.

One Cadet steered the barge while another stood in the prow with a long pole to keep the barge from running into the river bank or just to help out as needed.

I remember taking the Cadets to the river and "sweating out" their safe return to the debarkation point. The entire Corps took part, some as Ushers, the Gun Crew that fired the 21-gun salute, and the Field Band that played ruffles and flourishes for King Antonio when he arrived at the head of the parade at the Arneson River Theater.

PMA was important and necessary in the early days for a successful parade. I must admit, I was, as always, proud of the Corps.

NOTE: Colonel Dick Thiesen participated in the D-Day Landing in Normandy, and after World War II was Professor of Military Science and Tactics at Peacock Military Academy for five years. He is an Honorary Member of the Alumni Association.
