1934 Peacock Senior Ring

March 10th of this year, a lady named Judi Seiders of Temecula, California posted on our Peacock Military Academy Forum on Facebook. She was asking for help with information about Peacock. It so happened that she had come across a very old Peacock senior ring. I sent her my phone number and asked her to please call me. She did call and we had a good discussion. I told her all about our school's history. She told me that she bought, sold and collected antique jewelry. Ms. Seiders bought a jar of trinkets at a yard sale for \$5.00 and found a 1934 Peacock senior ring in the contents. I told her about the Wesley Peacock House where we display our memorabilia. I also told her that we would love to have the ring. She agreed that we should have it, and if the owner could not be found, it should be put on display with our other memorabilia. I provided her with my mailing address, and she sent me the ring.

Our Peacock directory lists 16 kadets in the class of 1934, and three show deceased. One kadet has contact information but cannot be reached. The remaining 12 kadets have no contact information.

The ring was so old that it could not be determined who had owned it. At our April Board meeting, the ring was placed in a glass display case at the Wesley Peacock House for all visitors to view and enjoy.

Judi Seiders was so generous to donate the ring. I told her to contact me if she was ever in the San Antonio area, and arrangements would be made for her to see our memorabilia and the ring she so graciously donated.

WESLEY PEACOCK HOUSE FACELIFT AND FACEBOOK

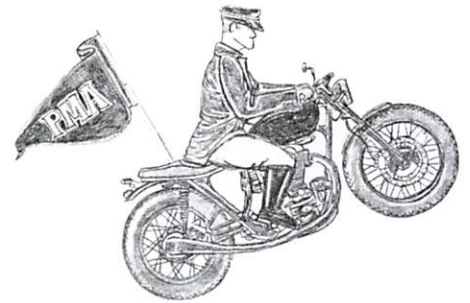
This spring, with the great help of Mr. Juan Reyes, Salvation Army Business Manager, the Wesley Peacock House received a beautiful facelift!

PEACOCK CAVALRY RIDES AGAIN!

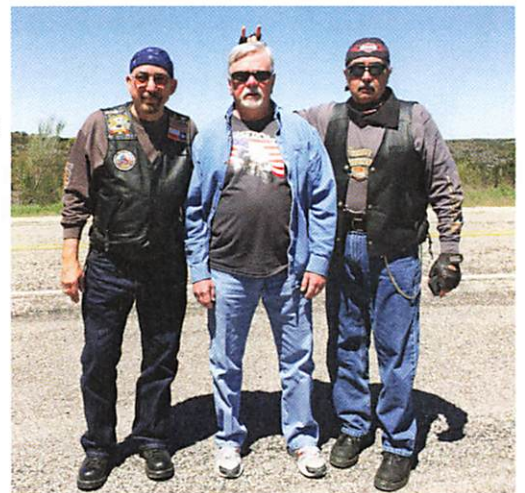

105 Howitzer

The 105 Howitzer was developed just in time to see service in WW II. It was the standard artillery piece of every infantry division. The design allowed the Howitzer to be towed behind the 2 ½ ton truck. Thousands of 105 Howitzers were made and one found its way to the Peacock Academy lawn.

Apparently you needed a sponsor to acquire an artillery piece for a static display. A few years ago, I ran across a letter from the VFW Post 1533 in San Antonio. The VFW made the arrangement to have the 105 Howitzer placed on display at Peacock Military Academy. To my surprise, the letter was signed by my uncle - Russell Duryea - a WW I veteran and a member of Post 1533.

The Peacock Howitzer has survived and is on display at the San Antonio Academy East Lawn.

Conversations with Conrad Banspach PMA CLASS OF '37

Conrad Banspach is a Peacock Cadet who lives in St. Petersburg Florida. Conrad's accent denounces his Texan roots, and as he says, he is proof that "you can take the Texan out of Texas, but you cannot take Texas out of a Texan.

We start our conversation with "May I please speak to Mr. Conrad Banspach?" "This is he, who is calling?" I then respond with: "This is Arthur Wolf from Peacock Military Academy Alum..." which is quickly interrupted by a hilarious and witty: "What the heck did I do now?" from Conrad.

What follows is an hour long conversation that will always register in my heart and that proves to me once again how deep our Peacock bonds are. It doesn't matter what class we belong to, there is something deeply mystic about our school that transcends generations.

Conrad grew up in San Antonio, first attending Alamo Heights High School. I asked him how he ended up at Peacock and he hesitated for a moment. He then said that he would tell me as long as I did not share his secret. I told him I would only share it with other Peacock Cadets. So his secret will be safe. Conrad admitted that while at Alamo Heights, he had a disagreement with another student that ended being resolved in a manner involving fists. After that incident, his family decided that some of his "rough edges" needed some smoothing out. And that is how he came to Peacock. He graduated in 1937 and then attended St. Mary's University graduating with a degree in Physics and a minor in Math in 1941.

Conrad loves flying. He started flying at age 17. In 1941 the US had not entered the war, so he decided to go up to Canada and joined the Royal Canadian Air Force. Later that year "Roosevelt repatriated us all, because he had intentions of entering the war". "I was back in the U.S. at Scott's Field in St. Louis when Pearl Harbor was attacked". Conrad then went into action with the US Air Corps as it was known then.

During the war he flew all types of planes. "I got the jobs others did not want". He flew P-38 reconnaissance flights over China. He flew B-17, B-24, B-25's, etc. Basically, because of his abilities he got the opportunity to fly and gain experience that most others did not, since most individuals only flew one type of airplane. He was then fortunate to become a flight instructor and was also sent for radar training at MIT. Conrad was an APQ13 Radar Navigator instructor, "Isn't it amazing I can remember so much?", he says. Conrad trained the crews that flew the B-29's (Enola Gay and Bockscar) over Hiroshima and Nagasaki on radar operation and navigation.

After the war, Conrad who was a Communications Officer and Instructor, stayed in the military until 1948 when he started a construction enterprise. He was working in remodeling projects at Fort Sam Houston and Kelly Field when Korea broke out. Once again, he joined the military but his Quartermaster, as he had pledged on doing, had him stopped and sent back to San Antonio to complete his construction projects on the bases. Conrad later also flew commercial aircraft, including the first commercial jets.

Conrad Banspach was happily married to Beverly Anne, the love of his life, for 60 years. They had two wonderful boys together. Conrad and Beverly moved to Florida where his construction business flourished. Beverly Anne passed away 3 years ago. Conrad lives in St. Petersburg. He is still very active with his business, Conrad Construction Consulting Company, and other activities.

Conrad Banspach, PMA Class of 1937 is a true example of The Great Generation and an inspiration to many. I must say that I have not personally met Conrad, but when I speak to him (twice in the past two months), I feel a bond that is difficult to explain. I enjoy listening to him and I hang on every word. He talks about how Peacock influenced him and helped him be successful in the military. He felt he had "a certain advantage that made him go far". It is an honor to be linked to such a man through our mutual Peacock heritage. We will keep in touch.
