THE WESLEY PEACOCK HOUSE NEEDS YOUR HELP



The Wesley Peacock House, which shelters all of our memorabilia and academy records, is in need of painting and restoration of other portions of its external structure. We plan on doing this in the Spring of 2019. Contributions to this effort are needed and appreciated.

This year of 2018, the Peacock House has undergone major repairs which have substantially decreased the funds allocated to our beloved historical site. Plumbing and Air Conditioning were some of the major items that were addressed and resolved.

The Peacock House Fund has had total expenses for 2018 of \$ 9,692. Contributions to the fund in 2018 have totaled \$ 6,333 of which \$ 3,600 were contributed by the Salvation Army. The House Fund balance today is \$409 which will obviously not cover our planned restoration.
