





THE "TWINS"

"We thought all of you would enjoy the following article written back in March of 1990 in an Army Newsletter called The Bulletin. The article describes a wonderful and fortuitous set of events between two 1973 Peacock graduates. William Tandy Walker and Byron Wesley McKinnon were both outstanding members of their Peacock class. Walker was the class Valedictorian. McKinnon was a class officer and yes, he was a dazzling member of the McKinnon Rifles drill team. The article was written just before Desert Storm operations. Both of them were in Ft. Irwin, CA together for that. Read on:

95th's Walker, McKinnon almost like twins

Maj. William T. Walker and Maj. Byron W. McKinnon, both of the 95th MTC, have a lot in common. Yet they are also quite different.

Both men were born on the same date: June 8, 1955. They graduated from Peacock Military Academy in San Antonio when they were 17. They also were teammates on the football, basketball and drill teams. Those are some of the similarities.

There are some differences, however. Walker is white. He was born in Yuma, Ariz., and raised in Peru, South America. McKinnon is black. He was born and raised in San Antonio.

D.S. AIN!

TWINS? Maj. William Walker and Maj. Byron McKinnon of the 95th MTC were born on the same day, schooled together, and entered the 95th in the same month.

They went to college at the same time: 1973-77. But Walker attended Carleton State University in Stephenville, Texas, while McKinnon went to Texas A&I University in Kingsville.

Walker finished with a B.S. degree in agriculture, while McKinnon received a B.A. degree in Business Management. But both of them were commissioned second lieutenants after graduating from the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC). Walker went into medical services, while McKinnon got into field artillery.

Both served on active duty for several years, and in 1981 the two men met again at Fort Sill, Okla.

Both are married, both have two children and both live in Oklahoma Walker, however, is a county agent living in Watonga, while McKinnon is a software tester from Lawton.

Surprisingly, both men joined the 95th MTC at the same time: February 1989. Walker is Team Chief with Medical Team #2; McKinnon is Chief, Operations & Training Division.

As for their off-duty interests, Walker's into raising hogs, while McKinnon says he's into "raising hell."

The Peacock-Eisenhower connection

James Baldwin '65, asked us to write about President Dwight "Ike" Eisenhower's connection to Peacock Military Academy. Our writings are based on Donna Peacock's Parade Rest Books and a Susan Eisenhower interview:

When we proudly mention our Alma Mater to people, we are often asked where Peacock Military Academy was. When we respond San Antonio, Texas, many of us like to add: "Eisenhower was a football coach there, you know?" Mentioning his name attached to our school makes us feel even more proud and it raises eyebrows in many listeners.

Peacock Military Academy had the honor of counting among its staff a young Lieutenant Eisenhower, recent graduate of West Point, who was stationed at the time at Fort Sam Houston. He joined the Peacock coaching staff in the fall of 1915.

Texan born Eisenhower excelled in athletics and was a starter in the West Point football team both as a running back and linebacker, gaining the honor of tackling the famous Jim Thorpe.

Shortly upon his arrival in San Antonio, Ike was introduced to a young lady named Mamie Doud. Their meeting became destiny. Much of their courtship took place on the Peacock campus. Wesley Peacock Jr. recalled seeing Mamie drive out to the school and park her car at the edge of the football field. In a 1973 letter, Mamie Eisenhower wrote: "I remember attending all the Peacock football practices. I sort of felt like a mascot." In fact, the Doud family became Peacock fans, coming out each week to cheer on "Ike's boys". They became genuinely emotional about Peacock beating their rivals, especially West Texas Military Academy, later known as TMI.

Peacock already had a good football team, and Ike made it an outstanding one winning the 1915 championship. Players such as Wesley Peacock Jr, and Yantis Taylor, first aviator to fly from the Mexican to the Canadian border, said that "Ike was great". "He really knew the game and instilled confidence in the team. He was able to get the most out of his boys who had to play both offense and defense, without relief."

A lasting bond was established between the Eisenhowers and the Peacock Family. General Dwight D. Eisenhower's appointment as Commander of the Allied European Forces in 1943 stirred a familial pride among present and former cadets whom he had guided on the playing field shortly before another world war.

Mamie Doud Eisenhower visited the Peacock Campus in the spring of 1944, six weeks before D-Day. She spent April 18th reminiscing with the Peacock family about when she'd watch the Peacock practices and games and especially young coach Lieutenant Dwight Eisenhower. She ate with the cadets in the Mess Hall and enjoyed a parade in her honor. Here is a note she wrote later:

To the Corps of Cadets of Peacock Military Academy – I send many thanks and deep appreciation for the beautiful orchid you gave me Sunday at the parade. Your gift and the thought made me very happy. I congratulate you on the fine Dress Parade and interesting drills. The best of luck to each one of you. Your friend, Mamie D. Eisenhower.

In the fall of 1952, then Presidential candidate, General Dwight Eisenhower requested an honor guard from Peacock Military Academy to greet him at the San Antonio airport. The McKinnon Rifles Drill Team- appropriately attired in West Point gray Eisenhower jackets – was commanded by Cadet Captain Richard Bradford '53 (who later became a Hollywood star). Bradford recalled he was "very impressed by the man.

He didn't give us the token nod, or wave." Instead he spent a good long time talking to Bradford and the unit, always politely and surprisingly asking permission: "May I inspect the troops?" or "Do you mind if the reporters take more pictures?" Ike noted that Bradford and the other boys were much bigger than those he coached back in 1915.

President Eisenhower returned

President Eisenhower returned to Peacock once again in the fall of 1961. Once again, a Peacock Military Academy Honor Guard greeted him. James Hyslop '62 was commander of the Honor Guard. Eisenhower spent about 15 minutes talking with Hyslop about football and the forthcoming game with TMI. "Meeting him is something I'll never forget, an incredible experience," Hyslop said.

Eisenhower was a leader who believed in self-discipline. He had the ability of remaining calm when facing problems or during a crisis. His description of a problem was: "the fear in the hearts of men". A true strategist looks at the fundamentals of an issue, with clarity that is not clouded by fear. "Not all fears are real threats", he would say. Eisenhower was indeed a true strategist, a very good and effective one, because he was a very articulate writer and eloquent speaker.

Ike was a non-assuming and modest man. He did not like to wear many ribbons or medals like the Soviet Generals. He was a soldier's General. He had to make many hard decisions during WWII. He was very analytical about decision making but never became cynical. On the eve of troops embarking for D-Day he spoke with many young soldiers. He did not engage in conversation about the mission, its importance or its dangers. He figured that all was planned accordingly. He knew that many would not return, so he talked with them about their lives back home, their families, their farms, their towns. That is the type of man he was.

Dwight David Eisenhower died in 1969: Soldier, author, college president, President of the United States, farmer, Peacock coach of the 1915 football championship team.
